Course Assignments

1. Problem Sets

There will be eight problem sets. Late problem sets will not be accepted under any circumstances, but you are allowed to drop one problem set. You are encouraged to work in groups (up to three students).

2. Midterm Exam

The midterm exam will be on Thursday, March 3, 2020, and the class will not meet on this day. The exam will be administered through Canvas. You can take the midterm anytime throughout the day. You will have 80 minutes once you start the exam, and the exam will close at 11:59pm. No make-up exam will be given unless you provide legitimate documentation, such as a doctor's note. The exam will cover material from lectures and problem sets. You are responsible only for the material that is covered during lectures and in the problem sets. The format of the exam will be similar to your problem set questions.

3. Final Exam

The final exam will be on Tuesday, May 3, 2022. You can take the final exam anytime throughout the day. You will have two hours once you start the exam, and the exam will close at 11:59pm. The exam will be administered through Canvas, and it must be taken at this scheduled time. No make-up exam will be given unless you provide legitimate documentation, such as a doctor's note. The final exam will be cumulative – covering the entire semester's material from lectures and problem sets. However, it will have a greater emphasis on the later material, after the midterm exam. The format of the exam will be similar to the midterm exam.

Grading Policy

Basic semester grades are determined by the final exam (30%), midterm exam (30%), and problem sets (40%). The tentative letter grade scales are below:

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A range letter grades (A, A-) if \geq90%;
B range letter grades (B+, B, B-) if \geq80%;
C range letter grades (C+, C, C-) if \geq70%;
D range letter grades (D+, D, D-) if \geq50%;
E if <50%
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The exact breakdown of each letter grade range depends on the shape of the distribution, and the final letter grade is subject to curve. Incompletion is not generally given for non-medical reasons. If you have any questions regarding your grade on your assignment or on

your exam, you must inquire within one week from the day the grades are posted on Canvas. No exception to this rule will be given.
