Course Objectives:

The objective of the course is to help students build an understanding of the basic concepts of macroeconomics. We will focus on the interactions of goods market, money market and labour market to understand the functioning of modern economy. A student will learn the impact of fiscal and monetary policies on aggregate demand and relate the concepts with real world issues. At the end of the course the students should be able to think analytically and apply the entire course understanding for further higher level courses of economics.

Teaching Method:

All the classes will begin with a lecture that covers the chapters mentioned in the course schedule. All the lecture slides will be uploaded on Canvas. Please feel free to ask questions on all the topics discussed in the class. I am open for feedback and so never hesitate to write to me or stop by my office.

Course requirements:

There will be one midterm, one final exam and 5 assignments which will contribute to your entire grading in the following way.

- I. Assignments: 50%
- I. Exams: 1 midterm; 25% and 1 final exam; 25%
